Also while reading this portion of Antigone I noticed that another point of view Kreon had on the situation was that Antigone was dishonoring her brother Eteokles by burying Polynikes. "KREON: Aren't you ashamed to talk treason? ANTIGONE: Ashamed? Me? Of loving my brother? KREON: Wasn't Eteokles your brother, too? ANTIGONE: Yes, by the same mother and father. KREON: Then how can you dare insult his memory? ANTIGONE: Eteokles would never say I did that. KREON: NO insult to honor the traitor?" Kreon thought that Antigone was dishonoring her brother (Eteokles) who fought for his city and was a hero, by trying to give her brother (Polynikes) who fought against his city a proper burial. Kreon thinks that this is totally
